

Since we first launched H2O Church, we've been all about raising up students at OSU to be disciples of Jesus who are equipped and prepared to influence their families, workplaces, and the world. And when we sensed God leading us to plant a city congregation, we knew that one of our big, unique tasks was going to be learning how to help students really flourish as they navigated the daunting transition from college life to whatever comes next. A year later, and we're still excited to see the ways God is teaching

us and helping us to grow in this critical ministry.

If you've talked to many people in the midst of this transition, you've probably noticed really quickly that most would say that they feel alone.

Life is simply very different in college than it is at any other time. And the new responsibilities and time constraints of life outside of college make it hard to feel connected

relationally... especially

for anyone who invested a large amount of their time in that kind of community in college, or for anyone who packed up their few worldly belongings and moved to Columbus for their first real job without really knowing anyone else at all. Many find themselves really needing and yet really lacking that relational connection and spiritual encouragement during their post-college transitions.

So we've been working hard to create authentic relational connections for the young adults in our City congregation, as well as to help them learn to pursue the Lord in the context of gospel-centered community even in the midst of that tough transition. Helping people connect relationally and forming gospel-centered community is the focus of our City Lifegroups, and this year, it's also the focus of our women's ministry: City Sisterhood. In addition, each year we form a "Rookies" City Lifegroup that is made up almost entirely of recent grads or grad students who can help each other navigate that transition and spur one another on to follow Jesus. And what we've seen, is that, yes, it is a really tough transition, but with some help, encouragement and a little direction, they are able to flourish as they begin to take ownership (more than ever before) of their own need to pursue Jesus together in community with others!

This semester our Missions Team started a new ministry called People Group Engagements (PGEs), where we are trying to live out engaging the nations in Columbus with the gospel. We've had two PGEs thus far, with one being a visit to a local mosque to learn more about the Islamic Faith Community in Columbus. At the mosque, we had an

opportunity to bridge cultural gaps (the women who went chose to wear head coverings to show respect to the community at the mosque) and start conversations that we dream will continue to provide opportunities for the gospel to go out.

We will also send a team to Guatemala in March, where the team will teach English at an impoverished school and engage in spiritual conversations with other college students with the goal of proclaiming the gospel. SLICE OF LIFE

I grew up in a Christian household. And though I was baptized as an infant, I never really understood why. Therefore, I would complain and beg the question "Why are we doing this? What's the point?" each week as my family and I would attend church. I believed in God and that Christ died for my sins, but I "believed" it more because I taught this is I should believe, and I went with it.

So, I lived according to what being a "good child" meant, and I held tightly to the image that everything was great in my life. However, I hit a wall just before college started--an identity crisis--and my image began to unravel. I started distancing myself from longtime friends, and I began getting involved with a different crowd that pushed me to party and drink. Slowly, I found myself overwhelmed with guilt from the constant lies I told in order to keep my image clean and the lies I told to my parents that everything was fine. Yet, I was ultimately feeling a deep sense of loneliness I had never felt before. Nobody really knew how I was, and I continued to mask everything I was feeling and masked the guilt I was experiencing.

My feelings of guilt and loneliness continued through my first two years of college as I isolated myself from any sort of community on campus, despite a few close friends who were a part of H2O and invited me to events. Instead I rejected their invitations, and I put all of my effort into pursuing women and relationships that never panned out, which devastated me.

Despite my efforts to push away, my friends' pursuit of me continued, and I ended up attending Winter Park Leadership Training (LT) during the summer of 2016 after being asked to take a "leap of faith" by a few leaders within H2O. Honestly, I didn't know what I was really getting into when I joined LT. Mainly, I wasn't sure if I was going to be accepted by this new community, or if I was just going to feel like an outsider for the entire summer. Thankfully, these thoughts were quickly put to rest as I was accepted with open arms and shown grace by the LT community. They brought me to truth, brought me to learning and loving the gospel, and loved me unconditionally--something I will never forget.

So much happened over that summer, but I noticed something change when some of my closest friends were baptized during LT. Feeling pulled toward baptism, I spent months after LT ended conflicted as to what I was supposed to do. I listened to sermons, researched baptism and asked the pastors of H2O a lot of questions. It took me nearly a year to figure out

what was going on, but when I finally understood, everything seemed so clear: I am now living my life according to Christ, not just thinking I believe in Christ. See, for the first 21 years of my life, I didn't truly understand what I believed. But God had fully gotten a grasp on my heart and was giving me an invitation to publicly declare my faith and visually demonstrate His gospel through baptism. So on October 8, 2017, I accepted His invitation and was re-baptized in my reconquered faith.

If you were to ask me where I would be currently about a year ago, there is absolutely no way I would have guessed that I would be here. Truly, this is not by my own doing, but by God's. God now has a firm grip on my life, a grip of which I know that He won't let go, and that is one of the most freeing feelings I have ever known.
