

I grew up in a Christian home and went to church every Sunday. I attended church camps and youth groups as far back as I can remember. It was always my main activity going on outside of school. That’s when, during a church summer camp in middle school, I was surprised when the pastor asked us to consider the moment we were saved – and I realized I couldn’t quite put my finger on any specific moment, I sort of just assumed it must have happened subconsciously or something during all the church stuff I was at. So that’s now “my moment” – the moment where I specifically prayed the prayer and told God that I knew he was the one true God, that He came to Earth and saved me, and I asked for forgiveness for all my many sins.

I’ve struggled with sharing my story because it can seem so plain to me. By God’s provision I was born into a Christian family, in America, and never had to worry about my basic needs being met – so many blessings I take for granted and I always wonder why God has blessed me so abundantly when I am so undeserving. Because of these blessings, and my naturally introverted, risk-adverse personality, I’ve never really been tempted to do anything really considered “wild” by this world. But that doesn’t mean my sin struggles are any less than any other. My sin struggles continually come in form of selfish ambition, pride, and jealousy.

So, a bit more about myself – Christian upbringing, Christian girl. I was an introvert who was home before curfew – if I even went out at all – and graduated high school early to work more-plus, high school wasn’t fun to me anyway. I was always hyper focused on academics and my resume. I avoided doing anything crazy just out of fear of a blemish on my record. I can become so easily prideful and selfish.

Something reoccurring that stands out in my life has been moving. I have lived in 9 different homes, across 6 different states geographically ranging from Pennsylvania to Utah. And no, I wasn’t in the military. The latest move was last summer, from Omaha Nebraska to here. Each move was different and special in some way but this one felt big. My husband, Broderick

got matched at OSU for his residency, and for me this was an opportunity to trust God because I knew nothing about Ohio or what type of job I could even get there. I feared my network and resume I had worked so hard to build would be meaningless in a new state.

Which it sort of was. But again and again, God provides more and more than I could have expected. He allowed this transition away from family, friends, and a good job in Nebraska to be peaceful. He gave me a job that I can honestly say 100% was not a result of my own resume or network but simply His provision. It humbled me and has grown my faith. Both my job and Broderick’s job requires us to be apart at times, either because of traveling or working long hours. During these periods it becomes even more obvious that God’s love encompasses us together and individually; and that love is what I base my core self on.

There’s maybe a few years for me in between moves that my life just seems slow. But regardless of whatever season I’m in, I try to fight to grow closer to God, not comfortable. I have found that for my heart, volunteering and giving of myself is a way to continue to fight my sin struggles and grow closer with the Spirit and the Lord’s heart. Volunteering challenges me to look away from myself and to others. I start by looking for needs in my community that I can help with. In Omaha, I connected with Thai refugees, which started to soften my heart for the refugees in America. In Columbus, I found the Bridge which is involved in the education of many Somalis in our community. This program opened my eyes to other religions and cultures that have expanded my narrow frame of mind. Beyond that, there was a need for City Life Group leaders in my group. God put on my heart to walk deeper in obedience to Him. So, in a step of faith, I have begun leading (the best) CLG with some of the most encouraging people I have ever met. They pour back into me and give selflessly.

In short, each day I continue to learn that God uses the ordinary, the introverted, and the simple, to bring Him glory!
